Class Description

The course will be taught in three separate modules.

Module A: Central issues in philosophical logic

1. Propositional and predicate logic
2. Modal logic
3. Conditionals: from the material conditional to Stalnaker's semantics
4. Vagueness and the sorites: fuzzy logics and supervaluations

Module B: Central issues in philosophy of language

1. Frege's semantic theory
2. Russell's theory of definite descriptions
3. Kripke on rigidity and direct reference
4. Kaplan's theory of indexicals
5. Semantics and pragmatics, radical and moderate contextualism

Module C: Central issues in philosophy of fiction

1. Fiction and the role of imagination
2. Fictional content, truth in fiction and the cognitive role of fiction
3. Reference in fiction: the nature of fictional entities

Grading and Assessment

An essay (up to 3,000 words) based on one of the modules, chosen by the student (weighted at 60%) and one in-person written test with questions concerning the other two modules (weighted at 40%). Students must attend to at least 2/3 of the classes.
