## **Class Description**

The seminar focuses on the analysis of the essayistic production of one of the most important poets and influential essayists of the first half of the 20th century, T. S. Eliot. Through an extensive reading of The Function of Criticism, After Strange Gods, Tradition and Individual Talent, Shakespeare and the Stoicism, Hamlet, Dante, The Metaphysical Poets and Baudelaire, and by calling on other Eliot's essays or letters whenever relevant, we will reflect on how post-romantic poetic theory conceives of relevant topics such as the relationship with previous strong voices, tradition, fragmentation and the limits involved in the revelation of the self. This analysis will also be complemented by readings of Eliot's poems and essays by other authors.

#### **Grading and Assessment**

Assessment is based on three elements: oral presentation (25%), essay (50%), sessions participation (25%)
