Class Description

The present course revolves around Charles Baudelaire and his legacy in the immediate aftermath of his life as well as for the development of lyric poetry in the 20th-century. Through the in-depth analysis of his two collections, Les Fleurs du Mal and Le Spleen de Paris, we will navigate the complex landscape of the European lyric in the post-romantic era and tackle the formation of a modern poetic consciousness. As a privileged point of entry into issues of urbanization, industrialization, progress, and social justice, Baudelaire's poetic corpus reveals a stratification of concerns that range from aesthetics to philosophy to sociology. These concerns translate into the restless search for a new poetic idiom and new poetic forms, such as the prose poem, which strive to fix modernity into

durable artistic expression. During the semester, we will also consider Baudelaire's prose production, which reflects the evolution of taste and sensibility in such fields as art and music criticism, social and anthropological analysis. Finally, each component of the course will allow us to put Baudelaire in dialogue with other authors who are largely indebted to him, such as the later symbolist generation, Avant-Garde and modernist poetry.

Grading and Assessment

Students will be graded based on the following components: course attendance and participation in the class discussion; regular posts on course website (Moodle); final argumentative paper. The exact grade breakdown will be available in the finalized syllabus.
